elcome back! In this issue, I am pleased to report on recent activities regarding some of our students and faculty and to focus on the work of the Office of Multicultural Affairs (OMA). This semester, OMA is excited to kick off the 2008–09 academic year in the Kirkhof Center, its new location. In May, OMA moved from Lower Commons to the Kirkhof Center into its newly built and shared space with the Women's Center. On October 7, we invite you to join us (OMA, Women's Center and Lesbian, Bisexual, Gay, Transgender Office) for a campuswide Grand Opening celebration.

In June, OMA welcomed Melissa Shelby-Theut, OMA/Excel academic advisor for Freshman Academy. This new position marks an exciting collaborative partnership between the Advising Resource Center and the Office of Multicultural Affairs. Freshman Academy is a support program that offers comprehensive and collaborative services to underrepresented students who have demonstrated strong potential for academic success in college. Students who participate in the Freshman Academy receive intensive academic support while engaging in service to the community and developing skills that will allow them to emerge as leaders in an increasingly global workforce and society.

We invite you join us throughout the year as participants in programs that focus on diversity issues specifically the Professionals of Color Lecture Series. On October 6, the second lecture series, "Does Race Matter?" will open with a review of the Democratic presidential candidate Barack Obama's speech regarding race. OMA continues to collaborate with faculty members who are doing research related to their academic fields. Dr. Olivia Williams, assistant professor of education, and Dr. Diane Green-Smith, assistant professor of social work, both made presentations at national conferences. Williams' research focuses on segregation (re-segregation) of American schools. Green-Smith's research focuses on HIV/ AIDS. Both women plan to share their findings as a part of OMA's Black History Month celebration.

I want to briefly mention about the new Bias Incident Protocol Policy cards. Each office will be receiving new cards. The cards have a new leading line that reads "Bias Incidents - They're No Joke". While GVSU safeguards individuals' constitutional rights and protected speech, the university is also committed to inclusion and equity. Therefore, the university will continue to engage in educational dialogue and seek constructive responses to address bias incidents. I hope that every member of the campus community will partner in these efforts.

# **Business and Finance Celebrates Diversity**



## **OMA Staff Serves the Community**

onnie Dang was appointed by Governor Jennifer M. Granholm on June 19 as a member of the Advisory Council for Asian Pacific American Affairs. The council was created in 2005 to review and advise the governor of the nature, magnitude, and priorities of policies and issues facing Asian and Pacific Americans in Michigan. The mission of ACAPAA is to advance the full and equal participation of Asian Pacific Americans in "One Michigan."

Asian Pacific Americans are the second fastest growing group in the U.S. and Michigan. As reported by the 2000 U.S. Census, the APA population in Michigan grew to more than 208,000 people, a 101.3 percent increase from 1990. In the U.S., 11.9 million people identified themselves being of Asian descent and 874,000 people as Pacific Islanders, representing about 4.2 percent of the U.S. population. APAs originate from nearly 50 countries and ethnic groups with distinct cultures, traditions and histories. APAs speak more than 100 languages and dialects.

Dang said it will be a privilege to serve the people of Michigan. "I look forward to taking on the challenges as well as the opportunities to build a strong and vibrant community for all," she said. "As Michigan's population increases in diversity, all citizens stand to gain from a better understanding of the APA community. A more accurate public perception of APAs will facilitate coalition building with other ethnic communities, establish more inclusion and acceptance and create a cohesive working, learning and living environment."

am a native eastsider—born and raised in metropolitan Detroit. After I graduated from high school, I moved to Chicago to attend Concordia University-River Forest. After earning my bachelor's

degree and teaching certificate, I moved back to the Detroit area to begin my teaching career. I taught literature and composition courses to 10–12th grade students at Oak Park High School.

Though I loved my job and knew that I would miss my students, I left Oak Park to pursue a master's of social work degree at Grand Valley. Beginning in 2006, I first served as the assistant director of the Educational Support Program Recently I accepted a new position, advising students and coordinating the Freshman Academy. This marks an exciting collaboration

Beginning with the 2008-09 academic year, there will be several significant changes to the Freshman Academy. The new Freshman Academy will be an academic-year support program offered to eligible students throughout their tenure with Grand Valley. Students will receive comprehensive academic support, including advising and tutoring. They will engage in service to the community while building leadership skills, developing professional competency, and participating in activities that promote intercultural awareness. The services offered through Freshman Academy will assist students in achieving academic, personal, and professional success in an increasingly global world.
