- On January 17, the new week-long commemoration of Dr. Martin Luther King (MLK) Jr. legacy unveils with an MLK Breakfast at 9 a.m. in the Grand River Room, Kirkhof Center, Allendale campus. The Silent March begins at noon at the Zumberge Library and follows by the MLK Program featuring filmmaker and social justice activist Judy Richardson.
- On January 19, Dr. Michael Eric Dyson, professor of sociology at Georgetown University, delivers the MLK keynote address, "What's Next: Dr. King for the 21st Century" at 5 p.m. in Louis Armstrong theatre, Allendale campus.
- From February 1 through February 14, the computer station in the OMA is reserved for students to complete the "myGVSUsurvey". The OMA staff members will be available to answer any questions.
- February is dedicated to the celebrations of Black History. In collaborating with the Brooks College of Interdisciplinary Studies, on February 1, Harriet Washington will contextualize some main topics of the book, The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skloot, at 6:00 p.m. in the Grand River Room, Kirkhof Center, Allendale Campus.

- On February 9, the Asian Pacific Islander American Heritage Celebration kicks off with the "Ütake" performance featuring a blend of music, art, and poetry. Ütake is a trio concert comprises of the shakuhachi flute, piano, and percussion. Distinguished Japanese-American artist Tom Nakashima offers a pre-concert presentation on art and philosophy in the Japanese culture. Throughout the concert, Grand Valley faculty and students will read some traditional Japanese poetry in Japanese and English. The program starts at 5:00 p.m. in the Cook-DeWitt Center, Allendale Campus.
- On March 23, in collaborating with the Office of Student Life, the Professionals of Color Lecture Series features "Speaking of Faith: Interreligious Dialogue in the 21st Century." A panel of distinguished religious leaders will explore religious identity and examine how family, social and political influences contribute to their religious journeys. The program begins at 3:00 p.m. in the Cook Dewitt Center
- On March 31, Juan Buriel, author and faculty of english at College of the Canyons in Valencia, California, delivers the Cesar Chávez keynote address following the Silent March at noon at the Zumberge Library, Allendale campus.



On January 19, Dyson will deliver a keynote address, "What's Next: Dr. King for the



21st Century." Dyson was named by Ebony Magazine as one of the 100 most influential Black Americans. He is the author of 16 books, including Holler if You Hear Me, Is Bill Cosby Right? and I May Not Get There With You: The True Martin Luther King Jr.

Other events for the week include a Day of Service, honoring King and civil rights leader Ella Baker, MLK Breakfasts, Silent March and MLK Program featuring social justice activist Judy Richardson.

This year marks the creation of the MLK Executive Planning Committee. Chaired by Bobby Springer, Office of Multicultural Affairs, and Kathleen Underwood, Women and Gender Studies, the Executive Planning Committee is responsible for the development and oversight of all MLK events.

# King/Chavez/Parks **Future Faculty Program**

he King-Chavez-Parks Future Faculty Fellowship Program is designed to increase the pool of traditionally underrepresented candidates who are pursuing faculty or administrative careers in postsecondary education. The program, which receives state funds, has been administered by the Office of Multicultural Affairs since 1987 and has consistently enrolled about four fellows per academic year. Since its inception, KCP-FF has admitted 58 fellows and 47 fellows graduated.

For the 2010–2011 academic year, KCP-FF welcomed two new fellows: Rebeca Velazquez, who is pursuing a master's degree in public administration and works as the operations coordinator for First Steps; and Anneshia Freeman, who is pursuing a master's degree in social work and works as a program coordinator/substance abuse counselor for Arbor Circle.

The recruitment and selection process is administered by OMA, in conjunction with the Graduate Studies Office. The application deadline is March 1. Visit www.gvsu.edu/oma for more information.
