NOTES:

- Psychology majors are strongly encouraged to choose a major that provides knowledge and skills relevant to their chosen career
- For those planning on pursuing a Ph.D. in psychology, research experience is crucial. Two years of research experience are highly recommended. PSY 499 is just one way to gain research experience. Consult with your faculty advisor to plan the types of research experience that would be most relevant to you. A minor in Applied Statistics can be useful.
- For those planning on pursuing employment directly after graduation or continuing on for a master's of social work degree, practical field experience through volunteering and the PSY 490 Practicum can be very valuable.
