Figure 1: Graduate Degree-Seeking Headcount 2013-2023



Major Initiatives

New Graduate Programs 2023-24

During the 2023-24 academic year, no new graduate programs were approved through the university curriculum process. The total number of GVSU graduate programs is 45.

The Graduate School continues to support newly appointed Graduate Program Directors (GPDs) and assist with issues related to recruitment, admission, and enrollment in all graduate programs.

New Combined Degree Programs

During the 2023-24 academic year, no new combined degree programs were approved through the university curriculum review process. The total number of combined degree programs at GVSU is 27.

PACES Professional Development Program

The PACES program offers professional development opportunities for graduate students, and supports students' development in the areas of: professionalism, academic advancement, communication, engagement, and success. By participating in PACES, graduate students develop communication, interview, stress management, and financial management skills – among other critical and timely topics.

During the 2023-24 academic year, 12 sessions were hosted both in-person and virtually. One of the biggest hits was the in-person etiquette training over lunch in the University Club. We also added a focus on mental health by hosting 6 meditations session throughout the year and an additional session focused on trauma sensitive mindfulness practices. The Zoom sessions were recorded for future viewing. All recorded sessions can be found on the PACES website.






Ongoing Activities

Graduate Exit Survey

To evaluate and continually improve graduate education, the Graduate School administers the graduate exit survey. At the end of each academic semester, graduate students who are nearing the end of their degree program are invited to complete the survey and assess their graduate experience at GVSU. Of the 972 invitations sent to graduate students during the 2022-23 academic year, 399 (40%) completed the survey. As applicable, the data and summary reports were shared back with colleges, supporting units, and graduate programs.


Students receiving their undergraduate degrees from GVSU accounted for 37% of the respondents. Respondents' decisions to pursue a graduate degree included career advancement goals as well as desire to continue education and requirements within specific fields (Figure 1).


Figure 2. Perceived Graduate Program Quality at GVSU

Overall program quality was rated as very good or excellent by 78% of respondents (Figure 2).

When asked about how well they felt their GVSU graduate program prepared them to enter or advance in their field of study, 85% reported "yes" or "definitely yes" (Figure 3).

Finally, when asked to name highlights of their graduate degree program, four over-arching themes emerged from the data:

- Faculty Involvement and Support: Many respondents highlighted the exceptional support and involvement of GVSU faculty
 members. Professors were described as approachable, understanding, and willing to provide individualized attention and
 constructive feedback.
- Fieldwork and Practical Experience: The emphasis on field education and experiential learning was consistently noted.
 Respondents appreciated hands-on learning opportunities, field placements, and the ability to apply classroom knowledge to real-world settings.
- Cohort and Peer Relationships: Building strong connections with peers and forming a supportive cohort was frequently mentioned. The sense of community and collaboration among students was a positive aspect across graduate programs.
- Intellectually Challenging and Relevant Curriculum: The curriculum's intellectual rigor and relevance to professional practice were routinely lauded. Respondents valued the challenging classes, practical skills gained, and the opportunity to engage in meaningful projects and research throughout their GVSU coursework.

Outstanding Graduate Student Accomplishments

International Graduate Student Presents at GVSU Conference

Jowei Yek, an international student from Malaysia, had the opportunity to showcase his leadership experiences and achievements at the GVSU Leadership Conference. Jowei, who first came to Grand Valley State University (GVSU) in 2017, has had a profound impact



on the international student community and beyond.

Jowei earned his Bachelor of Arts in Advertising and Public Relations from GVSU and is now pursuing two master's degrees, one in Business Administration and the other in Social Innovation. His journey began with a focus on building connections as one of the few Malaysian students on campus. Through his involvement as President of the "Bringing Together the World International Student Organization" and his leadership during GVSU's International Student Orientation, Jowei became a crucial advocate for inclusivity and diversity.

He also served as the Graduate Assistant at the Center for Entrepreneurship & Innovation, where he applied his business acumen to help students create businesses with a focus on community impact. Jowei hopes to continue his efforts in promoting innovation and inclusivity in his future career. Jowei's commitment to student leadership and his impact on the GVSU community are a testament to his dedication to fostering cross-cultural understanding and entrepreneurial spirit.

Laker Nursing Advocate and Future Nurse Practitioner

Henry Peña, a dedicated and accomplished student in the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program. Throughout his time in the program, Henry nhas taken on numerous leadership roles, including serving as the President of the Graduate Student Association. His involvement in the Cook



Leadership Academy and as a Graduate Assistant in the Kirkhof College of Nursing has been instrumental in shaping his academic journey.


As a Registered Nurse, Henry's passion for healthcare is deeply rooted in his commitment to leadership, education, advocacy, and service. His holistic approach to nursing, which combines clinical expertise with leadership, sets him apart in the field. After completing his DNP, Henry plans to pass the nurse practitioner board certification exam and secure a position in primary care, where he aims to serve the Hispanic population with his bilingual proficiency.

Henry hopes to contribute to the future of nursing by teaching as an adjunct faculty member at the Kirkhof College of Nursing and serving on local healthcare committees.

Dr. Snyder and Biology Graduate Students Conduct Research in the Grand River

Dr. Eric Snyder, graduate program director of Biology, leads graduate research labs with his students in the biology department. Students in his labs are working on two research projects this semester, both focusing on the State Threatened Lake Sturgeon in the Lower Grand River. The projects are being conducted in partnership with the Grand Rapids Public Museum, John Ball Zoo, Encompass Socio-ecological Consulting, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The first project involves capturing juvenile Lake Sturgeon to collect genetic samples and mark the fish in case of recapture. The length and weight of the fish are also collected to better understand the fish's fitness when finding a surrogate to reproduce. One of the project's purposes is to increase the genetic diversity of the Sturgeon population in the Grand River. Most of the work is done at nighttime using a spotlight to identify the juvenile Lake Sturgeon in the shallow waters searching for its distinct movements and coloration. A single female Lake Sturgeon can produce up to 700,000 eggs in the Spring. In the Fall, students can attempt to estimate how many survived based on the number of juvenile Lake Sturgeon they are able to identify during their research. Ben Gunnett, a graduate Biology student, is working to develop a habitat suitability model for the juvenile Sturgeon in the Lower Grand River.



identified passively. Establishing methods for identifying adult Sturgeon is important because it can help reproduction efforts to increase the number of juvenile Lake Sturgeon. Eamonn Powers, a graduate Biology student, is involved in this adult tracking project.

Dr. Snyder emphasizes the importance of engaging students in conserving this iconic species.





Outstanding Thesis Nominees

The Midwestern Association of Graduate Schools (MAGS) annually calls for nominations for the Distinguished Thesis Award. Each school is allowed to nominate one student thesis for the award competition in each discipline category. The award categories rotate each year to allow for greater student representation across the disciplines.

The theses representing GVSU are selected by a committee of faculty members from multiple disciplines and approved by the Vice Provost of the Graduate School.

Dissertation and Thesis Approvals

The policy on Preparation of a Thesis or Dissertation at GVSU requires attendance at a Thesis and Dissertation Workshop for students beginning a thesis or dissertation. Students are required to attend a workshop the first semester they are enrolled in thesis or dissertation credit hours.

The Graduate School hosted 10 workshops in 2023-24, led by Dr. Jeffrey Potteiger. In total, 76 students attended these workshops. The workshop includes an overview of the thesis and dissertation-related policies, how to select a chair and build a committee, resources for writing and editing, and helpful suggestions on timelines, getting started, and finishing the project. To accommodate hybrid and online students, at least two workshops per semester were held virtually via Zoom, while the other workshops were held in-person.

The Graduate School also continued to update the Guidelines for Preparation of Theses and Dissertations to assist students in the timely submission of their final work. Communication is sent to students regarding submitting thesis/dissertation committee membership, reminders on defense and submission dates, and follow-up on continuous enrollment.

When students form a thesis or dissertation committee, the Graduate School provides a Thesis and Dissertation Flowchart and Checklist outlining the steps students must take to comply with the current guidelines. Graduate Assistantships 2023-24

The Graduate School oversees the graduate assistantship program at GVSU. Our primary role is to ensure that hiring departments adhere to the Graduate Assistantship (GA) Policy, to verify student eligibility for holding a GA position, and to ensure that funds allocated for graduate assistantships are appropriately utilized. We act as a liaison between appointing units, Financial Aid, and Student Employment, addressing budget, payroll, and tuition matters. Our role includes providing advice and guidance to faculty and staff managing graduate assistant appointments within their units. Additionally, we collaborate with units and students to resolve issues related to any aspect of graduate assistantships.

Typically, GA appointments are made for the academic year, corresponding with the first day of the Fall semester and ending the last day of finals week at the end of the Winter Semester. Some units maintain some extended positions (10-month and 12-month). Extended positions are mostly utilized by units that need assistance beyond the regular academic year, such as the Office of Financial Aid and Housing. Some appointments are made semester-by-semester. Spring/Summer appointments are separate positions from the academic year.

The move to hiring graduate assistants in Workday occurred in January, 2024. The Graduate School serves as a liaison between appointing units and Student Employment in assisting appoint units with the new hiring process.

Special Projects Graduate Assistantship Positions 2024-25

TGS provides funding for special project GAs to departments, units, and faculty that demonstrate a specific need. Criteria used for awarding special project GAs are: the impact of the project on the academic mission of the university, the project's congruence with the university's mission and vision and the objectives of the Strategic Plan, the roles and responsibilities for the requested GA were appropriate for a graduate student and congruent with a degree program or a set of skills required in an academic discipline, and evidence that the need could not be met through other budget processes.

Sixty-five faculty/staff members submitted proposals for special projects GAs for the 2024-25 academic year. Of those, 21 full-time (1.0) positions for one academic year were awarded, and 8 half-time (.5) positions for one academic year were awarded.

Academic Conference Fund

The Graduate School administers the Academic Conference Fund for graduate students to provide grants (\$600 for domestic travel and \$800 for international travel) for presentations at academic conferences. Students must be the primary presenter of research at a professional conference, or whose creative work is accepted for an exhibition or performance at a recognized event.

The application is submitted along with a brief budget, evidence of acceptance to the conference, and a letter of reference from a faculty member who can attest to the quality of the student's work or the academic benefit of attending the conference/meeting. Students must be in good standing with the University and should be either current graduate students or recent graduates whose research was accepted for presentation prior to graduation.

Presidential Research Grants

The Graduate School administers the Graduate Presidential Research Grant program. Grant awards up to \$1,500 are provided to graduate students to support their research endeavors. Students must be degree-seeking, and the research must be tied to completion of some aspect of their graduate degree. Usually, these grants will be in support of research undertaken for purposes of the completion of a dissertation, thesis, or final scholarly project.

Students submit an application with a detailed budget, a description of their research, and a letter of support from their major advisor or research advisor. Applications are reviewed by a committee comprised of the Associate Vice-provost of The Graduate School and faculty members representing a cross-section of disciplines. The full Graduate Council (GC) convened on September 22, 2023 and met a total of 8 times through April. Graduate Council has two subcommittees that each meet 2-3 times per month. To ensure each college has representation, one member of each collect serves on each committee. The Graduate Council Curriculum and Program Review Committee (GC-CPR, Mark Staves, Chairperson) reviews all curricular changes and program reviews. The Graduate Council Policy Committee (GC-PC, Amy Campbell, Chairperson) addresses faculty senate charges and develops and revises policies as needed.

Graduate Council Curriculum and Program Review Subcommittee Activities

The chair of GC-CPR and UCC met early this academic year and determined that GC would review all graduate curricular proposals, rather than limiting the review to new programs or curricular changes. This academic year, the GC-CPR reviewed and approved 51 course changes, 9 new courses, and 8 program/curricular changes. They also completed 6 program reviews including: Clinical Dietetics, Educational Leadership, Educational Specialist, Engineering, Physician Assistant Studies, and Social Work. For each program review, committee members participated in the site visits and developed a final report that summarizes and integrates the program's assurance document and external reviewers report. The final reports will be approved during the April 26th GC full council meeting.

Graduate Council Policy Subcommittee

In addition to addressing ECS charges (described below), the GC-PC revised the Graduate Independent Study policy (SHORE #1401) and developed a new policy for the use of AI in theses and dissertations (SHORE #1402). Both policies were approved by UAS and are being reviewed by the Provost.

Graduate Council Charges: 2023/2024

Graduate Program Culminating Experiences: Review all culminating experiences of graduate programs and make recommendations as needed. SHORE Log #1179

Graduate Council reviewed all culminating experiences for existing graduate programs. A report was submitted to SHORE, and will be reviewed by ECS/UAS in Fall 2024. Graduate council to the full council for approval in January. determined that the current policies and procedures are working well for programs, and that no changes are needed at this time.

Graduate Student Experience: Define what the graduate student experience at GVSU should be, identify needs, and make recommendations to improve the graduate student experience, as warranted. SHORE Log #1180

Graduate council reviewed data related to student experiences outside of the classroom from the most recent graduate student exit survey.

Graduate Program Review: Evaluate the graduate program review process, documents, and templates and revise as needed. SHORE Log #: 1181

Program Review-Related Reportage: Contribute to work on program review-related reportage in connection with other governance committees (UAC, GEC, FSBC). SHORE Log #: 1255

Equity in Graduate Faculty Workload: Develop a university-wide policy to address equity related to workload at the graduate level.

Optimum Membership/Faculty Representation: Please review the standing responsibilities of your committee and while thinking about workload, determine the optimum and appropriate faculty membership/representation of your committee and make a recommendation.

The policy subcommittee addressed this charge in January 2024.

- 1. Graduate Program Culminating Experiences The GC-PC reviewed policies, procedures, and practices related to culminating experiences. A draft report was developed and will be presented to the full council for approval in January.
- 2. Graduate Student Experience:

The GC-PC reviewed several years of existing data from the graduate student exit survey regarding student perceptions

related to their academic and student life experiences at the university. A draft report was developed, and will be presented

3. Graduate Program Review:

The GC-CPR is preparing for site visits for program review this winter. All site visits have been scheduled.

Additional Activities

The GC-CPR reviewed and approved one program change request. The GC-PC made changes to the Independent Study policy. The policy will seek approval from the full council in January.
