Employer Possibilities - Universities and colleges generally have advisors for each department/major that they offer. For example, a college/university may hire for a new psychology advisor. **Example –** University of Michigan is hiring a "Coordinator of Academic Programs – Student Success" the position spends 40% of time advising students and 60% of time implementing programs to advance student's success across campus (Winter 2018)
