Course description: This course will introduce you to the theories, research methodologies, and applications of psychology – the study of human behavior – and help you appreciate the importance of psychological phenomenon in your own life. A wide range of topics will be covered; some students consider the course to be rigorous and difficult because of this. However, it is important to remember that all of these topics refer to our experiences as humans...and chances are, all of us have spent some time contemplating the causes and consequences of our own and other's behavior. You are encouraged to apply your knowledge of the material to your own lives and the world around you.

This course is part of GVSU's General Education Program. Introductory Psychology partially fulfills the requirement of the Social and Behavioral Sciences category in Foundations. As part of the General Education Program, the goals of this course are to help students develop a) an understanding of how knowledge in the social or behavioral sciences is created and applied, b) an understanding of the major approaches, methods, theories, and substantive findings of the field, and c) an informed critical stance that will allow students to weigh and apply ideas and claims from the social and behavioral sciences outside of the classroom. The skills goals for this course are critical and creative thinking and ethical reasoning (see the following link for more details: https://www.gvsu.edu/gened/syllabus-view.htm?course=101&subject=PSY).

Learning Objectives: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify major psychological theories and concepts and use psychological terminology correctly.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the scientific process in psychology.
- Critically evaluate the findings of psychological research.
- Recognize examples of how psychological concepts are applied to daily life.

Course Evaluation:

1. Attendance and Participation (60 points): Learning is a social process and happens best when you are present and engaged (paying attention). I will be tracking attendance by passing around a sign-in sheet at the beginning of each class and please sign your FULL NAME. It is your responsibility to be sure that you have signed in.

ATTENTION: Exams will be in the 5th, 8th and 11th week, please take it punctually.

- 2. Syllabus Quiz (20 points): You will complete a short syllabus quiz by the 1st week of class.
- 3. Homework Assignments (3 x 60 points = 180 points): We will have a total of three homework assignments this semester. The materials and instructions for these assignments will be post on Blackboard Ultra. Please see the course schedule for the homework assignment due dates. *Note: late assignments will not be accepted.*
- 4. In-Class Activities (15 total but 3 dropped; 12 x 15 points each = 180 points total): We will have a total of 15 in-class activities this semester, each worth 15 points. In-class activities will *not* be announced ahead of time. *If you are not present for any reason, you will not be able to earn credit for a missed in-class activity*. However, students will be able to drop 3 missed activities. In other words, if you miss 3 in-class activities, you can still obtain a perfect score. 12 in-class activities will be counted towards your final grade. Therefore, you can miss up to 3 in-class activities and still obtain a perfect score (60 points). *These 3 "freebies" account for all reasons for missing so please do not ask me about make-ups*.
- 5. Exams (3 x 100 points = 300 points): There will be THREE within semester non-cumulative exams. These exams will include information covered in textbook chapters, other assigned readings, in-class assignments and discussions, lectures, and other materials posted on Blackboard Ultra. Exams will be completed through Blackboard Ultra IN CLASS. On exam days, students will be responsible for attending class and bringing a laptop, tablet, or other mobile device compatible with Blackboard Ultra to class. Completing exams outside of class will be considered cheating. *If I find out that any student has completed the exam outside of class, the student will automatically be given a 0 and the university will be notified for further disciplinary action.* There will be no make-up options for missed exams unless discussed with the instructor prior to the exam day. Each exam will be worth 100 points.

Policy for missed exams. Students must take exams as scheduled in this syllabus in person. Students with documentations that can substantiate legitimate reasons for missing a scheduled exam could be given makeup exams consisting of essay questions. Please notify me by email as soon as you can. If I do not receive a written notification and documentations within a week of the missed exam, you will receive "0". Students without legitimate reasons for missing any scheduled exams in this syllabus will receive "0".

- 6. Cumulative Final Exam (200 points): At the end of the semester (i.e., during Finals Week), there will be a cumulative Final Exam (please see course schedule at the end of this syllabus). It will be worth 200 points and will be based on assigned readings (whether covered in lectures or not), class lectures and discussions, videos, and class demonstrations. You must take the Final Exam.
- 7. Enrichment Activities: Learning about psychological research (60 points = 15 points * 4 credit) and please find detailed information on the last page of this syllabus.

Extra credits option (up to 45 points): Although only 12 in-class activities will count towards your final grade, students that complete more than 12 in-class activities will receive 15 extra credit points for each additional inclass activity they complete (up to 3 additional in-class activities possible). In other words, If you completed all 15 of the in-class activities, you would receive the 180 points for the in-class activities as well as 45 extra credit points.

Enrichment Activities: Learning about Psychological Research

In the Enrichment Activities (EA) portion of the course, students will be given the opportunity to experience psychological research first-hand. Two kinds of enrichment activities are available:

- *Option 1* involves being a participant in research studies conducted by Psychology Department faculty and students.
- *Option 2* involves completing activities that will introduce you to a variety of research techniques used in psychological research.

Students must earn **four** EA credits for this requirement. The credit you earn by completing each EA is a function of the amount of time it takes to complete it. For example, by participating in a brief online study (30 minutes or fewer) you would earn ½ of an EA credit whereas an EA that takes one hour to complete would earn 1 credit. Both types of Enrichment Activities will be available in face to face and online formats. You may complete the EA requirement using any combination of EA types, however, **at least two full credits of EAs must be completed in person.**

Enrichment activities are scheduled and offered through the Sona Study Scheduling System. You will receive an email at the beginning of the semester containing your User ID and an initial password, and a link to the Sona system website at <u>https://gvsu.sona-systems.com</u>. If you do not receive an email regarding your account by the end of the first week of class, please contact the Lab Supervisor, Hannah Todd, at <u>psychlab@gvsu.edu</u>.

Screening Instrument: Once you receive your User ID and password, you will be able to immediately earn .5 credits by completing an online prescreening questionnaire. This is a short questionnaire used by some researchers to determine your participation eligibility for studies carried out throughout the semester. You must be 18 or older to complete the prescreen survey. You are not required to complete it, but doing so increases the number of studies you will be able to choose from during the semester. You can complete the prescreen at any time from the My Profile tab on the blue bar at the top of the page, however, completing it early (within the first two weeks of class) ensures that you will have access to the widest variety of EA activities within the Sona System.
